### **Rest Assured: Why God Wants More for Us Than Sunday Naps**

"Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done." Genesis 2:3 (NIV)

Sometimes I've struggled mightily with the "Sunday Scaries" — anxiety about the coming week's workload. I've wondered about a challenge facing my kid, how a certain conversation at work will go, or if that bill will get paid on time.

Growing up, I was taught to stop work on Sunday as the Sabbath day because God rested after creating the world for

six days (Exodus 20:8-11). But even when I spent the day relaxing, the Sunday Scaries found me at night. I wondered if I was honoring the Sabbath correctly.

Through Bible study, I discovered my Sunday habits came from a modern reading of this sacred, ancient book. God's people who lived in Old Testament times understood the command to honor God's Sabbath differently than we do today. In their culture, rest represented the posture of ruling and reigning. Ancient Israel would have envisioned God seated on His throne, actively taking charge of His newly created world, on the first Sabbath (Psalm 132:14).

When God rested on the seventh day, He wasn't sitting down like a laborer weary from the workweek. Instead, He was positioned as a King ready to reign. He created for six days and made good things because He is good. Then He sat enthroned over creation, declaring it complete and perfect:

"Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done" (Genesis 2:3).

The gift of Sabbath is found when we reorient ourselves toward God. *rededicate* our trust in Him, and *reflect* on His trustworthiness.

Genesis 2:3 isn't about exhaustion or napping; it communicates that a good and trustworthy God is in control. He's got this.

The ancient Israelites would say we rest because God sits on His throne and reigns over His creation. Sabbath, then, is about honoring God's reign. Once a week, our souls

specially rest in the acknowledgment that God is in charge. We remember He's a good Creator who invented the concept of thriving. Our souls lead the charge for rest, insisting on finding peace in God's trustworthy rule, and then our bodies and minds follow.

For years, I thought Sabbath meant that if I rested, I could handle my week better. I thought, Well, if God needed a break, surely I do too. I was trying to keep the Sabbath by mimicking God. Unfortunately, I was focused on my kingdom and my upcoming week, resting in preparation to run my show.

But if we only focus on ceasing our work, chasing our rules and checking our boxes, our souls will remain exhausted by our worries — and the Sunday Scaries will still have their way.

The gift of Sabbath is found when we reorient ourselves toward God, rededicate our trust in Him, and reflect on His trustworthiness.

Where are you struggling to trust in God's goodness? Let's embrace the privilege of honoring His reign. Then we can rest assured that, yes, He's still got this.

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As our Friday series has been focusing on rest for the Lord, and I heard a sermon on resting on the sabbath, and then I got a devotion on resting on the sabbath, I felt I should really look at how I rest. I think back to when I was little and how we were not able to go out to eat because that would cause someone to work. We couldn't go shopping on Sunday because that made people work. Now as an adult if can take a nice two-hour nap, I really feel more rested and ready for the coming week. I used to think Sunday naps were boring as a child, but as an adult I look forward to it so much. On Sunday I do shop a little now, but I don't enjoy it as much as would go shopping on a Saturday. Eating out on Sunday I truly enjoy, and I feel I can spread God word to those at the restaurant or fellowship with other believers and it does boost my spirit. Attending church on Sunday with other believers is amazing and gives my spirit what I need to face all the challenge this crazy world can give us. So how do you rest on sabbath, and what day do you choose to rest? What childhood memories do you have about resting on Sundays?

Psalm 132:14, "This is my resting place for ever and ever; here I will sit enthroned, for I have desired it" (NIV).

### **The Bible & Personal Responsibility**

At certain times of the year it seems we read, see, and hear about the need for more personal responsibility in our local congregations, communities, states, and in our nation. God's Word has much to instruct us concerning "responsibility" or accountability for one's actions.

The Scriptures sometimes indicate that responsibility is shifted by blaming another person such as Adam did to Eve in Genesis 3:12. In Matthew 27:24 Pilate blamed the multitude for the injunction of crucifixion that he was about to issue to Jesus Christ.mPilate claimed he was innocent as he symbolically washed his hands before the crowd. Aaron blamed the people of Israel in Exodus 32:21-24 for his idolatrous leadership in the production of the golden calf. According the Bible we can not shift the responsibility for our behavior by blaming another person, by proclaiming our innocence, or by blaming society for our actions.

It has also been suggested that responsibility can be excused by ignorance. However, Acts 17:30-31 indicates that God is not overlooking ignorance. Instead He is commanding all people everywhere to repent because a judgment day is coming. Unbelief is not an excuse for irresponsibility either according to John 3:18-20. Belief in Jesus Christ, the light of the world, makes it possible to escape the coming condemnation. Some people rely on previous good works to escape personal responsibility. Even Moses during a time of uncertainty in Exodus 33:12-13 seemed to think that God should show him and Israel special grace because of his previous good works. Other individuals claim that responsibility can be excused due to one's ancestry. In Matthew 3: 7-12 John the Baptist warned the Pharisees and Sadducees that they could not trust in the faith of their father Abraham to escape the fire and wrath of judgment. Each of them would need to personally seek God in repentance, receive water baptism, and the baptism of the Holy Spirit. God's Word teaches that the Holy Spirit can give us the desire and the power to bear fruit (responsible behavior). It is the clear teaching of the Scriptures that irresponsible behavior can not be excused by ignorance, unbelief, previous good works, or one's lineage. Each generation and individual can decide to receive Christ as Savior and Lord (John 1:12) and begin to experience a new, full, and abundant life (John 10:10).

Finally, it is possible to increase responsibility by seeing ourselves as the Lord sees us (John 9:39-41). We will witness more responsibility when we truly show our appreciation for the mighty works of the Lord Jesus Christ and taking advantage of opportunities to change our irresponsible behaviors (Matthew 11:20-24). Can you visualize the increase in responsible behavior that could result from God's people searching the Scriptures, testifying about what Jesus Christ is doing in their lives, demonstrating the love of God in daily living, and seeking the honor that comes from only God (John 5:39-44)? During any season of the year we can honor the risen Jesus, the only King of Kings and Lord of Lords, with our responsible behavior.

Amie, a former resident says, "I didn't have to step outside the building; the grocery store, notary public, school, and post office were on our ground floor, just an elevator ride away! Because life there was so comfortable, I often wanted to keep to myself, thinking I didn't need anyone," Amie shares. "But the residents are so warm. They look out for each other. I learned that they need me, and I need them."

Like Amie, we may at times want to keep to ourselves and avoid community. The latter seems less stressful! But scripture says that a believer in Jesus should have a healthy balance of solitude and fellowship with other believers. The Apostle Paul likens the body of believers to the human body. Just as each body part has a distinct function, every believer has a distinct role, (Romans 12:4). Just as a body part can't exist alone, a believer can't live the life of faith in isolation, (vs 5). It's in the midst of community that we use our gifts, (vv 6 - 8; 1st Peter 1:10), and grow to be like Jesus (Romans 12:9-21).

We need one another, our togetherness is in Christ (v 5) with His help, as we look out for each other, we can cultivate a deeper relationship with Him and show others His love.

### **Everence Update**

FREE TAX FILING OPTION BECOMING MORE COMMON

Filing taxes will get easier and cheaper for people next year. The Internal Revenue Service and U.S. Treasury Department recently announced they are launching a permanent free tax filing program for the 2025 filing season, having tested it in select states this year. Though the Direct File tool was available only for limited taxpayers, like those earning less than \$200,000 and with only W-2 income, the IRS is planning to expand the program to more people and to all 50 states. The IRS has also extended its Free File program, in which taxpayers earning less than \$79,000 can use a commercial tax preparation software for free, through 2029.

Also, recently Everence held a Medicare refresher Webinar, which was recorded. If you wish to see this webinar on your own time, please let me know so I can forward the email to you that contains the replay. This could be a great refresher or just an introductory – depending on where you are with Medicare.
